Our Centers & History




Founded in 1976 by refugees for refugees, IRCO has over 40 years of history and experience working with Portland's refugee and immigrant communities. Following the 1970's political upheavals in Southeast Asia, Oregon and Washington were two of the first states to offer new opportunities and homes to refugees. A group of Vietnamese, Laotian and Cambodian refugees in Portland formed the Indochinese Cultural and Service Center (ICSC) to help newly arrived families adjust to American society and find jobs.

By the mid-80s, ICSC joined forces with another community-based organization, Southeast Asian Refugee Federation (SEARF). The newly formed International Refugee Center of Oregon (IRCO) became the sole service provider of employment services and job training for all newly arrived refugees, a role IRCO has retained ever since. We became the immigrant and Refugee Community Organization in 2001. In 1994, IRCO founded the Asian Family Center, the first of our culturally and linguistically specific one stop service locations, followed by the establishment of Africa House in 2006, as well as the creation of our Slavic & Eastern European Center in 2018 and Greater Middle East Center in 2020.



OUR VOLUNTEERS

To ensure high quality and consistent service to clients, each program specifies its own time commitment requirement from volunteers. IRCO has many <u>volunteering opportunities</u>; both one-time and long-term, as well as virtual, all of which can be applied for through our website. Multilingual volunteers are especially important and welcome to apply. Before committing to volunteering in a specific program, please be clear about the length in time expectations.

WHAT TO EXPECT

After applying for an opportunity, a volunteer can expect the following:

- > An interview with the program staff
- Background check required for specific volunteer or intern placement
- Program-specific training as needed
- Volunteers will be trained in reporting their individual monthly service hours on the Volgistics volunteer database
 - Volgistics log in portal
- Ongoing support and assistance

IRCO Volunteer Recruitment & Onboarding

- ❖ IRCO has numerous platforms for our potential volunteers, including our website. We welcome requests or questions through our volunteer@irco.org connection as well.
- ❖ IRCO Volunteers must complete and provide basic information about their education, schedule, and availability, contact details, and any relevant previous qualifications they may have.
- Most IRCO volunteer positions require an interview before recruitment. IRCO volunteer advocates schedule and interview with the prospective volunteer to see if they are a good fit for that specific position.
- ❖ IRCO Volunteer Team processes volunteer applications which includes a background check and a signed IRCO confidentiality agreement.
- ❖ Every IRCO Volunteer has their own Volunteer profile account. The volunteer team provides web-based training on the volunteer database, Volgistics, prior to the volunteer's start date. The training includes volunteer login access and detailed instructions on reporting monthly volunteer hours. Volunteers are also asked to review and update their profile and emergency contacts. - New Volunteers receive IRCO Volunteer Handbook, so they have a deeper understanding of IRCO's culture, mission, and history along with the cultural centers and the services they provide. It is a great reference point for IRCO volunteer policies, contact information and volunteer administration process.
- ❖ IRCO volunteers receive Role-Specific Training for their respective programs. Every IRCO Program Training might look different due to their nature. In general, these training courses help IRCO volunteers develop their skills and knowledge also the training clearly lays out the role specific procedures.
